Governor's Message

Fellow Rotarians,

The Rotary year 2001-2002 has begun. I take this opportunity to wish every Rotarian a very successful, harmonious, peaceful and enjoyable Rotary year. Regal presidents, you are the first class of presidents serving a full term in the new millennium.

Rotary International President, Richard D. King asks each Rotarian to focus on four issues. 1) Increase membership and charter new clubs. 2) Select new community service projects. 3) Select new international service projects and 4) Enhance the public image of Rotary.

Membership growth is the top priority for the Rotary year. To achieve this goal, President Richard King has introduced the "Global Quest" which is a major campaign for each Rotarian to increase membership. The plan asks each club to induct one new member each month with a net increase of 5 new members by the end of the year. New members are important to ensure the future of Rotary. They bring fresh ideas and add more energy to the organization. With more members, we can better serve our community and the communities in other countries.

Public image of Rotary is also important. When the public has a better knowledge of Rotary, people will be willing to join Rotary. R.I. President Richard King asks Rotarians to reach out to the business and professional leaders, who want to use their talents and skills to help others. They think and act like Rotarians. It is our business to bring them into Rotary. President Richard King also asks

us to help people who have been threatened by forces beyond their control and those who simply need a little help to put their lives back to normal. We take action because "MANKIND IS OUR BUSINESS".

I have set a district goal for a net increase of five members per club and to charter two to three new clubs. To achieve the goal of membership growth, I have formed a membership development committee under the capable leadership of district membership development chairman, PDG Raymond Wong. The committee consists of 14 members, each looking after no more than four clubs. Two training sessions have been held for the members and a third one to be held in Macau for the two members in Macau. All the committee members are outstanding and dedicated past presidents. Their duty is to help increase the membership of the clubs under their guidance. They will visit these clubs, discuss with the presidents the problem they encounter in recruiting new members and offer the solutions to overcome these problems. With the harmonious cooperation between the committee members and the club presidents, I have full confidence that the district membership could be tremendously increased by the end of the Rotary year.

A Membership Development Seminar will be held on Saturday, 4 August 2001 at the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine, Jockey Club Building, 99 Wong Chuk Hang Road, Aberdeen, Hong Kong. The organising committee chairman is IPP Meggy Tseung. Fellow Rotarians, please join us to share your ideas.

July is designated as Rotary Literacy Month. About

880 million people do not have the literacy and numeracy skills needed for a job. It is important to help people to achieve these skills. Because girls do not receive education in many parts of the world, two-thirds of the illiterate population is female. Providing women with literacy skills can have positive effects because a mother who can read will share her skills with her children.

Although 98% of the worlds' illiterate live in developing countries, many adults in industrialized countries are unable to complete employment forms. Rotarians are urged to address the literacy issues including primary education, vocational educational, teacher training and adult education.

An individual club may organize literacy project or award participants in an established program. Your club may participate in one of the following activities during the month of July.

1. Recognise the efforts of Rotarian teachers in your community who are making a difference in the lives of their students.
2. Reward young people who read books, tutor others, or win a spelling bee or essay contest.
3. Offer an award to the company with the most comprehensive literacy program for its employees.
4. Promote literacy and numeracy awareness by providing local radio stations and newspapers with public service announcements discussing the importance of education and highlighting the efforts your club is undertaking.

區總監的話



各位社友：

踏入 2001-2002 扶輪年度，我謹在此預祝各位有一個非常成功和諧、平和愉快的一年。各位輝煌的社長，你們是千禧年完整任期的第一班社長。

國際扶輪金恩社長要求每位扶輪社員集中精力在四件事上：1) 增加社員及創辦新社，2) 精選新的社會服務項目，3) 精選新的國際服務項目，及 4) 提高扶輪的公共形象。

本年度的當務之急是增加社員人數。為了達成這個目標，金恩社長推行「全球搜尋計劃」，這是一個發動每一位扶輪社員去增加社員人數的主要運動，要求每社每月有一位新社員入社，全年要淨增長 5 位新社員。對扶輪來說，新社員帶來新意念、新活力，是扶輪未來發展的保證，重要性不言而喻；社員愈多，意味我們對當地及國際社會可以提供更佳的服務。

扶輪的公眾形象其實亦同樣重要；當大眾對扶輪認識得更多，社會上就會有更多人願意參加扶輪。國際扶輪理察·金恩社長要求扶輪社員接觸那些願意運用其才能技術去幫助他人的工商領袖和專業人士，這些人士的言行思想與扶輪社員無異，把他們吸收成為扶輪社員是我們的責任。

理察·金恩社長更要求我們協助那些生活受威脅，卻又無力自救，但只需一點幫助，即能重拾正軌的人們。我們即伸友誼之手，因為「服務人類是我們的事業」。

今年，我為本地區定下成立二至三個新社，而每社要淨增長 5 位新社員的地區目標；為了達成上述目標，我成立了一個由地區社員擴展主委黃志偉前總監領導的社員擴展委員會；14 位委員全由熱心的傑出前社長組成，並經過兩次培訓，第三次專為澳門兩位成員而設的培訓班也將於澳門舉行；他們每人照顧不到四個社，職責是協助增加各社的社員人數。他們探訪各社，與各社長討論其面對招收新社員的問題，提供解決方案。從委員與社長間的和諧合作來看，我有信心在扶輪年度終結時，地區的社員人數得以大幅增加。2001 年 8 月 4 日星期六，社員增長研討會將在香港仔黃竹坑道 9 9 號香港醫學專科學院賽馬會大樓舉行，由蔣春蘭前社長任籌委會主席，請各位社友踴躍出席。

七月是扶輪識字月；全球約有八億八千萬人是不具備謀生的讀寫及計數能力。幫助這些人擁有這些技能非常重要。其實世界上三份之二的文盲都是女性，很多地方的婦女都沒有接受教育；

一個會讀寫的母親會教導她的子女讀寫，因此為婦女提供讀寫能力會大大減少文盲。

雖然世界上 98% 的文盲居住在發展中國家，但許多工業國家的成年人連求職表都不會填寫，在此呼籲各位社友重視小學教育、職業教育、教師培訓以至成人教育等識字問題。

個別扶輪社可組織識字計劃，或贊助參加現成的識字班。在七月，貴社可參與下列任一活動：

1. 表揚在貴社區內身為教師，令學生生活大為改善的扶輪社員的努力。
2. 獎賞喜歡閱讀、指導他人、或贏得拼字比賽或徵文比賽的青年人。
3. 對為其員工提供最廣泛的職務培訓計劃的公司給予獎勵。
4. 在當地的電台或報紙討論教育的重要性，突出貴社在這方面的努力等為大眾服務的通告，以提高識字和識數的重要性。

Nomination of Members to Serve on the Nominating Committee for District Governor 2003-2004

Dear Club Presidents,

I am pleased to announce that pursuant to Article II (1) of District Resolution No. 99-8, nominations are now open for candidates for election to serve on the Nominating Committee for District Governor 2003-2004 (the Committee". A copy of District Resolution No. 99-8 is enclosed.

Nominations will close by 5:00 pm on Friday, 17th August 2001 and the original of the attached Nomination Form must be returned to the address stated therein by this time.

The District Organisation for 2001-02 provides for 9 areas. Accordingly, there will be 9 representatives to be elected by the clubs, one representative for each area. For details, please refer to District Resolution No. 99-8. If you wish to nominate a candidate for the Committee, please note that -

(A) The candidate must be :

1. a past president who has served as a

president of his/her club for a full term (1st July to 30th June);

2. residing in the district; and

3. a member (except honorary member) in good standing of his/her respective club in the designated area.

(B) The candidate may not be a candidate for District Governor-nominee for the year 2003-2004, and will be barred for consideration to the office even if he/she has resigned from the Committee and regardless of whether he/she is selected to be member of the Committee.

(C) Only one past president from each club can serve on the Committee at any one time.

If you intend to nominate one of your club's past presidents, please observe the following procedure :

1. The Board of Directors of your club should first consider your club's candidate and check whether the candidate complies

with the qualifications laid down in District Resolution No. 99-8;

2. The Board would then resolve to recommend to the members of your club for adoption by your members at a regular meeting in the form of a resolution naming the candidate, provided that the members shall be given not less than 7 days' notice of the meeting.

3. The President should sign the original of the attached Nomination Form and return the same to me not later than 5:00 pm on Friday, 17th August 2001.

I have appointed DGE Gloria Chan to supervise and conduct all matters relating to the Nomination of Members to Serve on the Nominating Committee. Any questions related to the matter should be directed to me or DGE Gloria Chan.

Thoughts of the Governor Elect.....



When I was elected as the Governor Nominee in December, 2000, I was very much aware of the commitment and effort I have to put into our District.

I feel it is indeed an honour to be able to serve Rotary in this capacity. Like I always say, we play different roles at different times and stages of our lives. In the past six months, I have been opening my mind and heart to let every bit of information flow in and to experience all the events and interactions with fellow Rotarians that I came across---all these to prepare myself to step firstly into the shoes of the Governor Elect from July, 2001.

Everyone present was truly touched and moved by what was shown and the Rotary Spirit re-affirmed.

It was definitely more than a momentary emotional response for those who were present, in fact it helps to consolidate the source of our innate feel for humanity, as in every man, woman and child; especially Rotarians. They were sharing with us what seemed so distant and untouchable in fact was achievable and to the extent that is beyond our expectation. We go home, knowing that there are people we can serve better, projects we can start

implementing and at the other end soon, they will have better health, education, less hungry and living in more peaceful environment.

Yes, fellow Rotarians, we do have a mission and you all know this mission will be better achieved if we work closely together---strong, resourceful and committed. That is what I hope for at this new Rotary year, especially after attending a number of Clubs' Installation ceremony: Wanchai, New Territories, Channel Islands, and Tolo Harbour. Let the tired ones get some rest to attend to what is needed in their special stage of their personal lives, and "new bloods" carry on as I witnessed at the ceremonies.

When next July comes, I will continue on DG Johnson's good work and to work even harder on the less accomplished areas. To really get on with substantial project to serve, I hope all Rotarians indiscriminately join hands and work on in such a way that is even more cost-effective, especially partnering with other service organizations like what Rotary International is doing.

The Rotary International 92nd Convention kicked off on schedule on Sunday, 24th June 2001 at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas, U.S.A. attended by around 25,000 registrants from 131 countries including nearly 40 Rotarians and guests from district 3450 headed by our D.G. John Wan, with the assistance of the On-to-Convention chairman, Alcuin Li. In our group, there were PDGs Peter Hall, Arthur Au, Jason Yeung, Dom Vessigault together with DGE Johnson Chu and DGN Gloria Chan as well as the incumbent presidents, spouses and Rotarians. Apart from the above number of participants, there were around 5,000 registered online viewers through the Rotary website.

The opening plenary session marked with musical prelude from The Mariachi Campanas de America and Ballet Folklorico followed by welcome remarks by the Chairman of the Convention, Irving J. Sonny Brown and R.I. President Franklin J. Devlyn. United States President George Bush also gave a welcome speech through the television screen. Of course, Mayor Ed Garza of San Antonio, enthusiastically welcomed the well-packed audience at the Alamodome. The site was so huge that we have only one seating instead of the usual two seatings arrangement.

One of the most important announcements was that after years of negotiation, Rotary is now reinstated in the Peoples Republic of China as the provisional club status was granted by the Rotary International Board

to the Provisional Rotary Club in Beijing and the Provisional Rotary Club in Shanghai. Both representatives from the two provisional clubs were present at the Convention, viz., Vice President Christopher Bo Bramsen, (Ambassador of the Royal Danish Embassy in Beijing) for the R/C of Beijing and Hon. Secretary Frank Yih for the R/C of Shanghai. Members attending meetings at these two provisional Rotary clubs are counted as make-up attendance. The Provisional R/C of Beijing meets at 12.30 p.m. each Tuesday at the China World Hotel, Beijing while the Provisional R/C of Shanghai meets at 6.30 p.m. at the Regal International East Asia Hotel, Shanghai.

It was the first time ever that the presentation of the flags of the Rotary World was on horseback with well trained different kinds of trotting horses performing its skills in knelling when presenting the R.I. banner. The entertainment feature was the Rick Cavender Band and starring Glen Campbell.

Something different from the previous conventions were a large number of booths set up for selling jewellery, garments, daily accessories, Mexican and Texan art and crafts, tailoring (from Hong Kong) and Rotary articles. There were also booths for R.I. Task Forces, districts and clubs projects. Workshops were open to all Rotarians who want to learn more about the activities of these R.I. Task Forces and get involved in projects addressing these vital issues, such as:

1. Avoidable Blindness

2. Children at Risk & Crime Reduction and Violence Prevention
3. Diplomatic Relations, UNs & Partnering with Other Organizations
4. Environmental Concerns
5. Jobs for Disabled Persons
6. Membership Development & Membership Retention
7. Population & Development
8. Rapid Disaster Relief
9. Rotary Community Corps
10. World Community Service, Resource & Matched Clubs

Discussion workshops were also arranged for the following topics:

1. Maximizing Use of the Web by Clubs and Districts
2. Creating Successful RYLA Programmes
3. Incoming Club Presidents
4. Public Relations
5. Population and Development
6. Sending and Hosting Effective GSE Teams
7. Rotary Centers for International Studies

Full programme had been planned each day during the Convention and there was no time to spare if one really wants to participate in his choice of each topic.

Apart from the official programmes, we can relax at the House of Friendship to meet old friends and make new acquaintance over a cup of coffee and sampled local cuisine. Shopping for souvenirs from booth to booth was quite an excitement and enjoyed the best of Texas entertainment. Within the

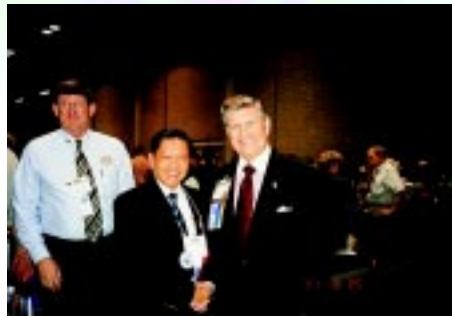


compound, we can locate personal computer website where we can send our email worldwide throughout the convention free of charge, but the queue was rather long.

As a yearly tradition, the R.I. Peacemaker Award this year was presented to the U.S. Peace Corps which recognized the organization's commitment to world understanding and peace and its ongoing efforts to help those in need, as well as the many volunteers of all ages who have served in the Peace Corps over the past 40 years.

At every convention, thousands of Rotarians and guests were invited to experience the culture and life style of the resident Rotarians by attending the "Home Hospitality Night" offered by local Rotarians. There was no exception this year. All those attended the "Hospitality Night" claimed that it was really a world understanding and rewarding evening.

While we were having our reunion dinner for the members from district 3450, others were flocking to the famous Don Strange Ranch in the scenic Texas Hill Country to



enjoy the one-hour rodeo show and a sumptuous dinner of Texas BBQ and Mexican specialties followed by dancing under the Texas sky.

On the last day of the Convention, there came the closing ceremony when R.I. President appeared on stage with his wife Gloria Rita to deliver his closing remarks. All in all, it had been a most successful Convention with entertainment by Fiesta Symphony Orchestra with guest stars Vikki Carr and Arturo Sandoval. With the singing of the Auld Lang Syne, the whole Convention was concluded in harmony. See you all in Barcelona in 2002.

There were not much sight-seeing spots in San Antonio, but the flat bottom boats strolling up and down the river is a must for tourists. The boat ride was free to all Convention registrants. It was something like the Gondolier in Venice but much bigger. On both sides of the river called the Riverwalk, there were numerous restaurants suitable to all tastes. The writer patronized a Hunan cuisine which was quite acceptable to his desire.



The next interesting place was the Alamo where the American and the Mexican fought their battles for independence dating back 1893. The Market Square lured a lot of visitors for shopping handicrafts and silverwares. A band of Mariachis performed in the middle of the square to add more enjoyment. There was a revolving restaurant on top of a high tower near the Convention site conveniently catered for convention-goers.

This report will not be complete without mentioning the generosity of our D.G. John Wan who played host to all delegates from district 3450 to a Texan/Mexican restaurant called Mi Tierra for dinner and drinks accompanied by a band of Mariachis. All participants enjoyed to their fullest extent with a lot of drinking, toasting, speeches and chatting. DGE Johnson, during his address, also promised to do likewise when we support him to attend the Barcelona Convention in Spain next year.
