Governor's Message

Hi! everybody, Happy New Year to you. As we are almost half way through this Rotary Year, it is now a good time to review what we have achieved and what is yet to be done. It is obvious to me that you have all worked very hard to achieve the goals each of us set the year.

Training and major Rotary business - we had very busy schedules right from the beginning of the Rotary Year. We had District Installation on July 4, District Rotary Foundation Seminar on August 30, District Membership Development & Retention Seminar on September 20, District Vocational Service Seminar on October 14, the 44th District Conference on November 15 & 16, and Rotaract District Conference on November 23.

Hepatitis B Immunization Project in China - we had Gobi March Lite on September 11 to 16, Fundraising Ball on November 15 combined with Governor's Banquet of District Conference, and District Walkathon on December 14. To commemorate all events and to support the China project, for the first time in Rotary history in Hong Kong, we have issued a set of two Official Stamps and a souvenir cover. This is a limited issue of stamp and rare collection that all Rotarians in the district should not miss out.

The members of the hard-working fundraising subcommittee have created an outstanding figure to reach our target to help to immunise 100,000 newborn babies in China this year. The total amount of money raised from the above programmes was about 2.9 million dollars. Many thanks to our diligent Rotarians including PP Sophia Chan, PP Kenneth Chow, PP Ho Lai Chuen, PP Edmond Chan, PP Sally Ho, PP Ada Cheng, DGS Tony Wong, etc. and million thanks to all fellow Presidents and Rotarians who helped to donate the money and gifts, and your time and effort to make this dream come true.

Visits - 53 clubs in the District have been visited officially from July to November. A special visit to officially from July to November. A special visit to Mongolia was made in August, where we had two new clubs chartered, RC of Niislel with 25 members, and RC of Zuunmod with 27 members. DG visit to RC of Beijing (Prov) was made in September and RC of Shanghai (Prov) in October, right after an official visit to 6 different Ministries of China in Beijing.

Fellowship and Family activities - an Interact Bazaar was held in August, District Swimming Gala in September, Karaoke Contest in October, Golf Tournament, Mahjong Tournament and Sports & Family Day in Macao all in November. In December we had Table Tennis Tournament. I must express my heartfelt gratitude to all fellow Rotarians of the hosting clubs and their family members who participated and supported the events.

RI President Jonathan Majiyagbe declared that December is the Family Month, for the first time in

the Rotary calendar. I am sure all Rotarians in the district enjoyed spending time with their families and fellowship over food and wine in many celebrations. So, please stay well and be happy together with everyone in your family. Keep good friendship and fellowship with every member in the club so that we can hold the Family of Rotary in good shape and good harmony.

During these six months, I heard words of compliments, encouragement, suggestions, different opinions and even criticisms. I think this is normal and fair. One senior Rotarian once mentioned to me that it was Benjamin Franklin who said to the effect that our critics are our true friends because they help us to identify our weaknesses. Thank to all the Rotarians who gave me all kinds of words of wisdom, guidelines and advices.

Scholarship - this Rotary Year 2003-04 is a fruitful year for the district with scholarship program. In the beginning of 2003 we received over 40 applications for different types of scholarship. After undergoing the selection and interviewing process, by July 2003, we have selected 6 outstanding applicants for the Ambassadorial scholarship 2004-05. The applicants were students in the area of public health, law, and architecture; each of them was sponsored by individual Rotary Club in the district.

In August we have also selected another 3 candidates from Mongolia, one Ambassadorial scholar, one World Peace scholar 2004-06 and one Cultural scholar. All these candidates have gone through application procedure in RI and confirmation with assigned study institute and hosting Rotary Districts have been sent to the candidates directly.



As a result, we have 7 Ambassadorial Scholars, 1 Cultural Scholar (6-month) and 1 World Peace Scholar for the first time a Mongolian student from District 3450 to be awarded after a high competition.

With this regard, I must thank PP Cynthia Lee, Chairperson of Scholarship subcommittee and all the committee members who contributed times and efforts working and supporting the whole process from reading the applications to interviewing candidates.

Talk of the town - since November the talk of future leader - District Governor Nominee for 2005-2006 has been running around the district. On December 5, 2003 our Nominee Committee chaired by PDG Arthur Au held a meeting and interviewed two candidates and as a result, Meggy Tseung of RC of Peninsula Sunrise had been selected by a narrow majority, and nominated to be the District Governor Nominee for 2005-2006.

However, according to RI Bylaws Article XIII, any club in the district may also propose a challenging candidate for governor-nominee. The challenging candidate must have been duly suggested to the nominating committee. The name of the challenging candidate shall be submitted pursuant to a resolution by the club adopted at a regular meeting. The Club must file the resolution with the governor by the date determined by the governor. Such date shall be at least two weeks after publication of the announcement of the selection for the governor-nominee by the nominating committee. The date had been confirmed to be closed on Monday, December 29, 2003 due to Christmas Holidays within the time frame.

I am glad that more than one Rotarian is going to offer service to district. Peter Wan of RC of Tolo Harbour was supported by several Rotary Clubs by submitting the Challenging Resolution of which has been reached my office before the captioned deadline. This is a good sign to see that there are Rotarians with enthusiasm longing to devote to Rotary. We do need such Rotarians who have the hearts, willingness, experiences, and responsibilities of both the community locally and internationally.

We respect the final result of the election after proper procedure to be done by ballot-by-mail from all clubs. But we also do respect both candidates who have done their best to show their devotion to Rotary. To both of them, I do urge them to stay friendship and keep up the spirit of real Rotarian.

Please share this with me, from My Road to Rotary: "Friendship was the foundation rock on which Rotary was built and tolerance is the element which holds it together."

DGE Column | 總監當選人感言

On 3rd December, 2003, I attended the Rotary Club of Hong Kong South's Leprosy Organizing Committee meeting, since PDG Raymond Wong, the district's representative to that meeting, could not make it that evening. It was a very long meeting, and everyone present participated to a great extent, demonstrating very clearly the Rotary spirit of co-operation, understanding and commitment in action. This is a very ambitious project and involves a lot of their resources both in terms of manpower and finance. The initial phase involves the renovating of several buildings for the Leprosy Center, and this is now in progress. The second phase involves the getting of sponsorships for the recurrent funding of the center. As I understand it, a very major charitable fund in Hong Kong has indicated interest in the matter and they are now still waiting for their final agreement to provide this funding. I wish them all the luck in getting this, since they may need to trim down on the size of their project should this funding be not coming. The third phase involves the building of certain schools for the lepers and they need considerable help from other Rotary clubs for the manpower to carry out this phase. I still remember that we promised to help them when we agreed to take up this project as a district project, so it is time that we honor our commitment to lend them the hands required.

On the 4th, the District Grants Subcommittee had a meeting in which 12 applications for our district simplified grants have been approved. It is apparent that many of our clubs were not familiar with the conditions in which grants were given under the Rotary Foundation, let alone the completion of the application forms, resulting in a lot of follow up actions by PP Stephen Lam, the secretary of the District Grants Committee, who undoubtedly has done an excellent job in this regard. As a consequence, the making of district simplified grants this year has been a very good training exercise for our Rotarians, and hopefully, this experience will help us in getting more matching grants successfully as well in the future.

On the 5th, the Nominating Committee for the 2005-2006 DGN met and selected PP Meggy Tseung as our DGN by a very narrow margin. It was the first time that the Committee had interviews on the two candidates in which both of them made very impressive presentations. In fact, some of the Committee members were so interested in the points raised by the candidates that they asked a lot of very tough and soul searching follow up questions that, at times, the interviews almost turned into 'witness questioning sessions'. It is interesting to note that both candidates were adamant to advocating reforms to our district, one being much more aggressive than the other. It is, therefore, just natural that a challenge was made on the decision of the Nominating Committee, so that all the clubs in the district have the final say in selecting their leader for 2005-2006 and, thus, on how aggressively they want to pursue reforms to the district. Undoubtedly, the challenge was also partly triggered by the very narrow margin mentioned above.

So, for the first time in the district's history, as I understand it, many of our clubs have cast doubts on the methodology of our existing DGN nominating procedure, the extent of consultations made by the area representatives to the clubs which elected them, and the extent of the involvement of the individual clubs in the election process. Obviously, this has generated a lot of awareness, and also of course interest, in the clubs about this subject and also in the affairs of the district. Whilst all this sounds very positive and constructive, I do hope that the candidates, and also their supporting clubs, do not take the challenge so personally as to damage the harmony existing among the Rotarians in the district. After all, Rotary means friendship and this philosophy need to be adhered to and also defended at all costs.

On the 8th, Rtn Dominic Ko, PP Vincent Ng, PP Grace Yen and PP Louisa Fong and I had a lengthy meeting to discuss about the current issues of our Interact programme, the activities of our Joint Interact Council, the extent of

support given to them by their sponsoring Rotary clubs, and what we can do to train our Interact presidents and their Rotarian advisors. Whilst the district should be congratulated for its impressive development on this programme over the past five years or so, it was generally felt that much more can be achieved, if our Rotary clubs place more importance on programmes involving the young generations. It appears that the problem lies somewhere with the structure of our Rotary clubs. At the moment, there are directors for the four avenues of service being represented in the club's board of directors, but no independent board representation for the Rotarian in charge of New Generations. As a result, the extent of the club's activities and, hence the importance placed by the club on such activities, depends very much on the director responsible for community service. If this director is not familiar with the New Generations nor heavily involved in their activities, then the scope of development of their New Geneneration activities could be somewhat constrained. This is not very satisfactory, having regard to the fact that more and more importance is now being placed by the RI on the New Generations, so much so that at one time, the RI Board even considered, as I understand it, to treat the New Generations as the fifth avenue of service.

The 14th is a memorable day for the district when we have the Hepatitis B Fund Raising Walkathon. It was the best walkathon that I have attended in my life. There were almost 2000 people who attended and the atmosphere was so warm! Undoubtedly, the organizing committee, and indeed the staff and pupils of the Ling Liang Church Kindergarten, had put in lots and lots of efforts in this exercise. It was certainly not an easy task to organize, and not to say motivate, 300 kindergarten teachers to pose as angels and other interesting characters along the route to give the children participants so much fun! This should help to promote a charitable spirit in these youngsters by the thought that charity can go together with such fun. Well done, everyone who has helped in making this event such a memorable one by organizing, contributing to and/or participating in, this event. Keep this up and you will make Rotary great!

Rotaract District Conference ~ November 23, 2003

The 2003 District Rotaract Conference was held in the University of Hong Kong on the 23rd of November from 9:00am until 5:00pm. In all, 180 people attended. Among them, over ten Rotaractors came from the Rotaract Clubs in Macau. The bond between clubs in different areas was clearly demonstrative during this conference.

This is my third time representing the Rotaract Club of Peninsula to join the Organizing Committee of the District Rotaract Conference. I enjoyed working with the Committee Chairman Max Lam, facilitator Lulu Chung and the representatives from the five hosting Rotaract Clubs, i.e., Lingnan University, Channel Islands, Hong Kong Island West, Victoria and Chung Chi College, Chinese University of Hong Kong.

The Conference opened by DG Jones Wong. The theme for this year is "Lend A Hand". We invited professor Sung Jao Yiu of the Chinese University of Hong Kong to be our honorable speaker. Professor Sung shared his experience with SARS in the Prince of Wales Hospital, drew analogies between SARS and the 911 incident in New York. He told us how medical people faced such difficult situations and cope with their frustration and depression when SARS was still in a mist. In the meantime, they had learned from the tragedies and just like the United States, Hong Kong was recovering. We had learned from the talk that we could merely seek for survival, we had to 'lend our hand' to other less fortunate ones.

Apart from sharing distinguished thoughts and experience, we also arranged panel discussions where important Rotary information, past and future events of the Rotaract clubs and our district, and many services that Rotaractors actively involved were delivered in order to better understand the

"Rotary spirit". We had learnt that Rotaract was not just a club; we were a team that aims to serve the community, learn from our organized activities as well as develop our own leadership skills.

After the lunch, all participating members were divided into groups to play different games that built up fellowship and taught us what the real meaning of "Lend A Hand" was. Meanwhile District Rotaract Chairman Parry Poon and the Rotaract Advisor's were sharing their experience and ideas on better handling Rotaract program. Being a Rotaractor, we had to strive to continually work hard, contribute more to the community as we upgraded ourselves.

In the late afternoon, the Rotaract club of Kingspark Hong Kong, Rotaract club of Macau, Rotaract club of New Territories, Rotaract club of Victoria and Rotaract club of Kwai Chung were invited to share with us their successful projects in the past year. These outstanding projects reflected their innovative ideas and hard work. They also demonstrated to us the spirit of 'Lend A Hand'.

The last part of this conference discussed to make revisions to the Standard Rotaract Club Constitution and By-laws, where several members brought forth the age issue of a Rotaractor. It was unanimously resolved that to propose to the RI Board of Directors that the maximum ago of a Rotaractor should increase from 30 to 35.

The conference ended at 5:00p.m. after the closing remarks delivered by DG Jones Wong, DRC Parry Poon, DRR Ruby Shek and Conference Chairman Max Lam. The conference was a success. The teamwork and spirit from both the university and community-based Rotaract clubs should be complimented.







RI President, UNESCO Chief Address District Governors in Joint Letter

RI President Jonathan Majiyagbe and United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) Director-General Koichiro Matsuura have co-signed a letter encouraging Rotary district governors to work together with the UN agency in promoting world peace and understanding.

"UNESCO and Rotary International share the goal of creating projects and programs in collaboration with other organizations (governmental, non-governmental, and civic organizations) that help build goodwill and peace throughout the world," the two leaders say in their two-page joint letter. "Working with UNESCO, Rotary clubs can expand their impact by initiating new projects to promote peace and goodwill in communities worldwide."

The letter encourage club and district leaders to collaborate with the National Commission for UNESCO in their countries to develop projects in education, science, culture, and communication. Functioning as a worldwide network, the 190 national commissions for UNESCO coordinate outreach to civil society groups.

In addition to organizing their own activities and helping to implement those of UNESCO, the national commissions serve as a special resource for disseminating information and best practices in program support and evaluation - often through the publication of books and documents in national languages.

"Rotary International's relationship with UNESCO dates back to a 1943 London Rotary Conference to promote international and educational exchanges," the letter explains. "Attended by ministers of education and observers from around the world and chaired by a past president of RI, the Conference was an impetus to the establishment of UNESCO in 1946. Today, RI maintains operational relations with UNESCO."

January — Rotary Awareness Month By PDG Peter Hall

Rotary International has designated several months to emphasize the importance of each topic throughout the Rotary year, such as January - Awareness Month; February - World Understanding month; April - Magazine Month; July - Literacy Month; August - Membership and Extension Month; September - New Generations Month; October - Vocational Service Month; November - Foundation Month and December Family Month.

Stepping into January, I wish to concentrate on "Awareness". The range seems very wide that we should be aware of things about Rotary. The first few common items should be top priority in Rotary administration, viz.,

- 1. Pay club, district and RI dues;
- 2. Renew Rotary Membership cards;
- 3. Notify RI about your club's elected officers for the ensuing year, such as the President and the Secretary with full names and addresses;
- 4. Make a half yearly survey about club's projects, especially Centennial project and membership drive;
- 5. Up date your club's Constitution and By-Laws in case you have not yet done so;
- 6. The Manual of Procedure and the Official Directory should be ready at any time;
- 7. The RI board encourage Rotary clubs to highlight the "Declaration of Rotarians in

Business and Professions" by including in their weekly bulletin, distributing it at induction ceremony, posting it in prominent places and reading it at meetings regularly. (This certificate can be obtained from the writer).

- 8. The RI board also discontinued the Disaster Relief activities, effective from 1st January 2003. Rotarians are encouraged to work through experienced international relief agencies.
- 9. The RI board noted that the Anaheim International Institute has been attracting fewer and fewer registrants and lacks the Internationality of the International Institute held annually in conjunction with the RI Convention, hence such meeting will be discontinued beginning 2003-2004;
- 10. The coming RI Convention will be held in Osaka, Japan from 23rd to 26th May 2004 while the Centennial RI Convention will be held at Chicago, USA from 19th to 22nd June 2005;
- 11. The Hong Kong bidding for the RI Convention for 2009 has been lost to Korea;
- 12. During the Singapore Zone Institute held in November 2003, the following motto has been declared "Every Rotarian Every Year", which means every Rotarian is expected to contribute US\$100 each year to the Rotary Foundation.

It was such a wonderful Sunday at the scenic Victoria Peak Hong Kong where more than 2,800 participants wearing Rotary caps, Santa hats or reindeer hats exercised our Rotary Theme 2003-2004 "Lend A Hand". With the full efforts, dedicated participations and generous sponsorship from Rotarians, Rotaractors and Interactors, their friends and relatives, teachers, parents and kids from HK Ling Liang Church Kindergarten, we had successfully raised up to HKD2M from this District Fundraising Walkathon for Hepatitis B Immunization Project In China.

The fundraising walkathon was jointly organized with HK Ling Liang Church Kindergarten and co-organised by eight Rotary Clubs such as Rotary Club of Bayview Sunshine HK, Rotary Club of Channel Islands, Rotary Clubs of Happy Valley, Rotary Club of Hong Kong Bayview, Rotary Club of Kowloon Northwest, Rotary Club of Shatin, Rotary Club of Tolo Harbour and Rotary Club of Tsuen Wan, with the support from all Rotarians, Rotaractors and Interactors of District 3450 and HK Ling Liang Church Kindergarten Alumni Association.

The participants in this three- mile walk for Hepatitis B immunization included 600 children under the age of 6 and their parents, 300 children at the age of 14 to 18, Rotarians, Rotaractors, Interactors, friends and relatives, teachers, government officials, religious leaders, television artists and members of the media. Backed by Ling Liang Kindergarten Alumni Orchestra, we sang together the Rotary and Kindergarten songs to initiate the opening ceremony at the Open Plaza of Peak Galleria in the beautiful sunny afternoon on Sunday 14

" Our District 3450 has extended its humanitarian and social services in Mainland China. Last year, we committed to work together with the Ministry of Health in China to vaccinate one million new born babies against Hepatitis B in ten years time", said District Governor Jones Wong at the opening ceremony." Hepatitis B is highly endemic and over one third of the world's carrier is in China now."

"This walkathon enables us to teach our children and kids from kindergarten to help and serve those in need "said Sophia Chan, headmaster of HK Ling Liang Church Kindergarten and Chairman of District Fundraising Committee. "Let all the children from our Kindergarten share their love with their parents to the new born babies in the poor area of China."

Followed by the lively "Chic Dance" performed by the kids of HK Ling Liang Church Kindergarten which aroused all participants to dance on spots and the popular "Hip Hop Dance" performed by the Interactors of District 3450 which attracted even the passengers at the Peak asking for the details of donations for this meaningful walkathon. Two television artists Miss Miu Siu Wai and Mr. Yuen Siu Cheung had cheered us up with a passionate speech and exciting imitate "Chic Dance" before District Governor Jones Wong and all VIPs who included the honorable guest Mr. Wang Rudeng, Assistant Director and Director General of HK Island Sub-office of Liaison Office of the Central People's Government HKSAR, officiated the walk.

"We are so glad to be here with you all and to see such a mega fundraising event with fun and fund from the Rotary to help the needy. We are also very impressed to see so many participants and the huge fund that Rotary has raised" said Miu Siu Wai, the television artist of TVB.

Over 150 volunteers who came from the hard working staff members of HK Ling Liang Church Kindergarten together with the energetic Rotaractors and Interactors of District 3450 distributed toys, accessories, drinks and other donated souvenirs at ten checking points during the walk. The children had a very good time to participate the games at each checking points and they were so happy and surprised to meet a group of charming little angels, Santa Claus and shepherds to welcome them.

The fundraising walkathon not only was fun and raised fund but also involved every member of the clubs and raised awareness in the community. We fully demonstrated our Rotary spirit and team work by joining our hands to make a difference for the lives of people in the other parts of the world. We had aroused over 2,800 participants to "Lend A Hand" and implemented the Four Task Force of this Rotary year: We motivated family of Rotary to participate, we educated our children to help and serve, we had health concern to Hepatitis B and had raised funds to alleviate poverty.

2003年12月14日星期日,當天風和日麗,二千八百多位參加者,分別來自各扶輪社、扶青團、扶少團、香港靈糧堂幼稚園的師生、父母,以至他們的親朋戚友,頭戴扶輪帽、聖誕帽等,齊集香港太平山頂實踐本年度的扶輪主題「伸出援手」,為中國"再創生命-扶輪百萬小兒健肝工程"步行籌款,一共籌得港幣二百萬元。

是次活動由本地區與香港靈糧堂幼稚園合辦,並由香港海景驕陽、離島、跑馬地、香港海景、九龍西北、沙田、吐露港、荃灣等八個扶輪社協辦,並獲本地區的扶輪社員、扶青團員、扶少團員及香港靈糧堂幼稚園舊生會的全力支持。

R.I Board October Action

Highlights of Actions Taken by the Board of Directors of Rotary International

The second meeting of the RI Board of Directors in 2003-04 was held at Rotary World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, USA, from 29 September to 3 October 2003. At this meeting, the Board reviewed reports from 13 committees and recorded 117 decisions.

October 2003 Board Meeting

Administration

The Board expanded its policy governing the use of the Rotary Marks by RI officers and other Rotary senior leaders, incoming, current, and past officers of RI and those Rotarians appointed by the president or the Board to serve in various capacities may use the Rotary Marks in printed or electronic publications associated with their role as an RI leader. However, they cannot use the Rotary Marks in conjunction with the trademarks or on the letterhead of any other organization, or for any commercial purpose. When using the Rotary Marks on a website developed in relation to their Rotary leadership role, such individuals must ensure that the website clearly indicates that it is not under RI's control.

Membership and Extension

To support membership development and retention, the Board encourages

- * district governors to organize clubs that appeal to New Generations members and to appoint New Generations subcommittees;
- * governors-elect to give greater emphasis to membership development discussion when planning PETS;
- * district Rotary Foundation alumni chairs to pursue alumni as prospective members;
- * clubs to devote one meeting to the discussion of membership development and retention issues during August (Membership Month).

Retired persons inducted into active membership in a Rotary club shall use their former profession as their classification, but this will not be counted towards the club's limit of members in a single classification. Club classification rosters shall not include retired Rotarians.

International Meetings

At its May 2003 meeting, due to budgetary constraints, the Board agreed not to fund 2004 pre-convention meetings for Youth Exchange officers, RYLA, and Rotaract. Noting that local Rotarians are keen to arrange an official Youth Exchange officers meeting prior to the 2004 (Osaka) Convention, the Board agreed that a local committee may organize such an event at no cost to RI and without RI involvement. The Board also agreed that official RYLA and Rotaract workshops will be held in conjunction with the Osaka Convention.

The Board accepted the proposal of the 2005 Chicago Host Organization (Districts 6420, 6440, 6450, 6460, and 6540) to hold the 2005 (Chicago) Convention on 18-22 June 2005. A convention registration rebate is available to all Rotary districts that register more Rotarians, spouses, and guests (over 18) prior to 31 March 2005 than 2% of the Rotarians in the district. Districts that achieve this goal will receive a rebate after the convention.

Finance

Observing that a significant number of clubs consistently fail to pay their RI per capita dues in a timely manner, the Board modified the collection cycle for clubs with financial obligations to RI:

- * Clubs with financial obligations will no longer have 'services suspended' prior to being terminated;
- * The Board will terminate clubs with financial obligations after 180 days, rather than 270 days;
- * Terminated clubs seeking reinstatement will be required to pay a reinstatement fees of US\$10 per member;
- * After 270 days of indebtedness to RI, a club seeking reinstatement will be required to pay a charter fee as a newly admitted club.

The new collection cycle will go into effect with 1 July 2004 RI per capita dues.

District governors may now use a portion of their estimated allocations to cover expenses associated with mandatory duties performed during the five-month period prior to their taking office.



國際扶輪理事會十月會議

國際扶輪理事會決議摘要

國際扶輪理事會 2003-04 年度第 2 次會議,於 2003 年 9 月 29 日至 10 月 3 日,在美國伊利諾州伊文斯敦國際扶輪世界總部舉行。理事會在會中審查了 13 個委員會的報告,並做出 117 項決議。

行政管理

理事會擴大了有關國際扶輪職員及其他扶輪高層領導人使用扶輪標誌的政策。國際扶輪下屆、現任、與前任職員,及由社長或理事會所任命擔任各種職務之扶輪社員,得在與其國際扶輪領導人角色有關連之印刷或電子刊物上,使用扶輪標誌。然而,上述社員均不得將扶輪標誌與商標並同使用,亦不得用在其他組織之信箋頭銜上、或為商業之目的使用扶輪標誌。在與其國際扶輪領導人角色有關連而發展的網站上使用扶輪標誌時,應確保在此一網站上明顯標明不屬於國際扶輪管轄的網站。

社員及擴展

為了支持社員發展及防止社員流失,理事會鼓勵:

- * 地區總監組織吸引新世代社員之扶輪社,並指派新世代小組委員會;
- * 總監當選人在籌劃社長當選人訓練會時,應更加 強調社員發展的討論;
- * 地區扶輪基金會前受獎人委員會主委,積極追蹤 前受獎人,視他們為可能的未來社員;
- * 地區及扶輪社設立扶輪家庭委員會,並推動適當的計劃以改善留住社員;
- * 扶輪社應利用八月間(社員發展月)的一次例會, 專門討論社員發展及防止社員流失的議題。

已退休人士被引進一扶輪社成為現職社員者,應使用他們先前的職業作為其職業分類,但是不列入該社某單一職業分類社員人數計算限制。一扶輪社之職業分類名簿,應不包含已退休扶輪社員。

國際會議

理事會在 2003 年 5 月的會議中,因為預算限制,未核准提供經費給2004年青少年交換職員、扶輪青少年領袖獎、與扶輪青年服務團的年會前會議。鑑於大阪當地的扶輪社員十分積極安排在2004年年會之前舉行一項青少年交換職員的會議,理事會同意當地一個委員會可籌辦此類活動,但國際扶輪不負擔費用,也不參與。理事會也同意將與大阪年會一併舉辦正式的扶輪青少領袖獎與扶輪青年服務團研討會。

理事會接受2005年芝加哥國際年會地主籌備委員會(第6420地區、第6440地區、第6450地區、第6460地區、第6450地區)的建議,於2005年6月18-22日舉行2005年芝加哥年會。凡在2005年3月31日之前,各地區註冊的扶輪社員、配偶、來賓(超過18歲)人數若超過地區內扶輪社員人數的2%,其註冊費可享有部份退費優待。凡達到上述目標的地區,將於年會後收到退款。

財務

鑑於未準時繳交會費給國際扶輪的扶輪社數目 甚多,理事會修改了扶輪社對國際扶輪財務責任的 收款週期:

- * 取消欠費扶輸社在終止社籍前暫停服務的規定;
- * 理事會將在扶輪社欠費 180 天後終止該社會籍, 而非 270 天後;
- * 要求被終止會籍扶輪社恢復會籍,須繳復籍費每 名社員 10 美元;
- * 對國際扶輪欠費 270 天後尋求恢復會籍之扶輪 社,須支付加盟費後才能獲准以新社加入。

新的收款週期將自2004年7月1日繳交每位社 員會費時生效。

地區總監在就職前5個月執行規定之任務時, 可使用一部份預估分配經費。
