### 區總監的話



第二屆地區游泳比賽  
2nd District Swimming Gala

各位社友：

2001年9月11日在美國紐約和華盛頓發生的悲劇，令我和內子感到莫大的震驚和悲痛；這次事件讓扶輪社員感到有義務團結一致，為世界瞭解與和平效力。我已致函國際扶輪金恩社長表示哀悼，諸位可參閱地區網頁。同時我建議本地區的扶輪社按意願在開例會前，為是次慘劇的失蹤及死難者默哀一分鐘，以示悼念。為此，國際扶輪金恩社長決定取消原訂在開羅舉行的非洲社長會議；有關取消的詳情，可向國際扶輪及扶輪基金的職員查詢。

九月是「新一代月」，我們的焦點在青少年交換計劃、扶輪少年服務團及扶輪青年領袖獎勵計劃等扶輪的青少年計劃上。

上月，扶少團聯席會議為兒童癌病基金籌款，特別舉辦了一個扶少團賣物會；會前，各籌委會委員犧牲閒暇，特別到各扶輪社的例會上努力推銷遊戲券，結果非常成功，吸引了數以百計的公眾人士帶同子女參加，場面熱鬧。能夠舉辦如此出色的賣物會，實要感謝去屆及現屆的地區扶青主委高禮禮前社長及吳偉明前社長的指導。

扶輪需要一個強大有力的正面形象，以助增強實力，為有需要的人士提供更佳服務。這次活動為扶輪的公眾形象提供了極佳的宣傳機會，扶少團員無疑表現出「服務人類是我們的事業」的精神。

扶輪青年領袖獎勵計劃 (RYLA) 是專為17至30歲社會上青年領袖提升領導能力而設的精研訓練課程，中選的青年可以免費參加由扶輪贊助及舉辦的一個從實踐中學習領導才能的課程。

從1971年開始，RYLA就成為國際扶輪認可的一項服務。每年，全球有數以千計的青年領袖參加這項計劃，而RYLA計劃亦起了強化扶青團及扶少團的作用，甚至經常促成新的扶青團或扶少團的誕生。

我對烏蘭巴托扶輪社作出輔導一個說蒙古語的新社的決定，感到十分快慰！該社已成立了一個由其Oyungerel副社長領導的籌備委員會，希望在三、四個月內，新社可以授證成立，為在烏蘭巴托的扶輪社員提供多一個補會的機會，大大提升個人，以致全社的出席率，相信是一個令本地區社員大大振奮的消息，我謹在此對烏蘭巴托社致以衷心的祝賀。

我已正式訪問了本區內過半的扶輪社；所有社長都準備充足，提供清晰的服務計劃，出席率也高。例如我探訪香港海景驕陽扶輪社時，其歷任前社長都全體出席，歡迎區總監代表團，連請假多時的一位社友都抽空出席，令我深受感動。

目前，我發覺區內所有的社都響應「扶輪的全球搜尋計劃」。有些社更訂出比我目標更高的社員增長數目。例如：九龍扶輪社預算在本年度內要把社員數目由75提高到100；吐露港扶輪社打算招募18位新會員；沙田扶輪社更準備打破不接納女社員的傳統，引入5男5女新會員，實在可喜可賀。

本地區對扶輪基金的支持更令人鼓舞。本地區大部分扶輪社都認捐5個保羅哈里斯之友；九龍金城假日扶輪社在辛迪寶前區總監的鼓勵下，認捐了10個保羅哈里斯之友；九龍東區扶輪社在黃志偉前區總監的帶領下，已捐獻超過1萬6千美元；感謝各位慷慨解囊的社友。認捐好，正式捐獻更好，請盡早捐獻，體現「服務人類是我們的事業」。

本年9月8日星期六舉行了一個成功的地區扶輪基金研討會，由扶輪基金地域協調人謝三連前區總監任主講嘉賓，他在會上作了發人深省的演講；會前，地區扶輪基金主委洪宏道前區總監給予籌委會適當的指導，黃志偉前區總監、辛迪寶前區總監、以至各位參與討論的講者在會上的大力支持，主辦社主委林鴻達前社長安排了一個極為出色的研討會，在此我謹致以深深謝意；當然，扶輪社員的熱心參與是研討會成功的一個重要因素。

澳門扶輪社Alfredo Sales Ritchie社長在研討會上呼籲，為一位在澳門急需做緊急心臟手術的4歲菲律賓女孩籌款。謝三連前區總監馬上回應，捐贈現金1,000美元。而當我在會前收到這個信息時，我立即轉達本地區多位社長，瞬間有多個扶輪社及個別社員即時作出捐獻，這一切即時回應，清楚說明了「服務人類是我們的事業」。

國際扶輪宣佈：本年度的2003-2004年度社長提名委員會已經一致通過提名尼日利亞Kano州Kano扶輪社的JONATHAN B. MAJIYAGBE出任2003-2004年度國際扶輪社長。我謹代表3450地區全體社友向Jonathan Majiyagbe社長提名人作誠摯的祝賀（公告原文見「2003-2004年度國際扶輪社長」段）。

本區另一個好消息是蒙古的烏蘭巴托社現已從新劃入第四地帶，3450地區不再被分割。歡迎烏蘭巴托扶輪社！

# Nominations for District Governor 2003-2004

## 2003-2004 年度區總監提名

Nominations are now open for District Governor for 2003-2004. The procedures for the election of the District Governor Nominee are outlined in the Manual of Procedure. Briefly, at the time of selection, the candidate must be a member in good standing in a functioning club in good standing with no outstanding indebtedness to RI or the district and has serviced as president for a full term. The candidate must have been a member for at least seven years by the time he assumes office and must also demonstrate willingness, commitment and ability to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of the office of governor.

In practice, the candidate would be endorsed by his club, and the club would forward the nomination to the District Governor, together with a statement by the candidate and a statement of his qualifications by the club. All nominations must reach the District Governor by 5pm on Wednesday 14 November 2001.

Club Presidents who are interested to nominate a candidate from his club can obtain the necessary documentations from District Governor in person.

The RI Board has adopted strict guidelines concerning campaigning, canvassing and electioneering to govern any candidate

considering election to the office of governor. A copy would be made available to the club president of the candidate and to any Rotarian on request.

In the meantime, proceedings for assembling the Nomination Committee for DGN 2003-04 are in progress through Ballot-by-mail. The balloting for membership of the Nominating Committee will take place on Friday 12 October.

The DGN Nomination Committee will convene on Thursday 6 December 2001 to consider all valid nominations from clubs and return the best qualified Rotarian as DGN to the District Governor. It should be noted that the Committee is not limited in its selection to the candidates submitted by clubs in the district.

Subject to the challenge procedures, the candidate nominated would be formally elected at the 2002 RI Convention in Barcelona, Spain.

2003-2004 年度地區總監現已開始接受提名；地區總監提名人的選舉程序已列明於程序手冊內。簡言之，該候選人於選舉時必須是在一個有地位，且運作正常的扶輪社中受尊敬的社員，並曾經擔任社長足一整屆，其所屬扶輪社必須無欠國際扶輪及地區任何債務；該候選人於上任時必須至少有七年社

齡，同時明示願意承擔、投入擔任地區總監，並顯示有履行地區總監職責的能力。

確實做法是：該候選人須獲得其所屬扶輪社同意，由所屬扶輪社把提名書、該候選人的聲明及該社就其資格所作的聲明，於2001年11月14日（星期三）下午五時正之前遞交地區總監。

有意提名其社員的社長可親自逕向地區總監索取所需表格及文件。

國際扶輪對有意角逐地區總監一職的候選人有所限制，對其遊說、競選、以至選舉活動有嚴格規定。詳情單張將發予有意提名其社員的社長，任何有興趣之社員可向地區總監索閱。

目前，2003-2004 年度地區總監提名委員會正透過郵遞選舉組成；選舉開票將於10月12日（星期五）舉行。

地區總監提名人提名委員會將於2001年12月6日開會，考慮從所有合格的提名中，推薦最合資格的扶輪社員為地區總監提名人，提交地區總監。該提名委員會的選擇並不只限於由地區內各社推薦的候選人。

根據選舉挑戰程序，被提名的候選人將於2002年西班牙巴塞隆納國際年會上正式選出。

## Thoughts of the Governor Elect

#### Our Service Partners

Right into the new Rotary year, our District Governor Johnson, Immediate Past District Governor John and I were invited to have a get-together with the DG of Lions, Joseph Ng; the Lions Assistant Governor Teresa Man, the current and incoming Presidents of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. We talked about the Charity Walk, our combined fund-raising effort last year and the possible joint effort in the near future. As an initial step toward a more concrete project, the meeting served well for maintaining contact and sharing of concern for membership growth in each of our organizations. We invited them to participate in our upcoming Swimming Gala to have their teams represented in our event.

#### Display of Originality and Dedication to Service

In the past couple of weeks, accompanying DG Johnson to various Official Club Visits and attending the "Forum on Economic Synergy in Hong Kong" as well as the "Rotary Foundation Seminar" and the

joint dinner for the DG visit, I witnessed the surge of energy and originality displayed by the teamwork among the Clubs of New Territories, Shatin, Tsuen Wan, Kwei Chung, Tolo Harbour, Channel Islands, Tai Po, and HK Sunrise.

Fragments of observation and reports from the board of the clubs vividly stand out in my memory: the continuous 100% attendance in RC of HK Sunrise since the beginning of the Rotary year is most notable and a fine example for us all; the attitude to serve in a hands-on manner by the RC of Causeway Bay; the congenial and warm atmosphere among members as well as their family members, the on-going project to help villagers to maintain higher living standard and life-style by providing and breeding of sheep by RC of TsimShaTsui East; the confidence and generous outlook on membership growth of RC of Kowloon; the committed effort of the Club to their signature project of Gift of Life by RC of HK Bayview; the exciting original project that is also a plus for the Rotary image (to take place soon and it is better to be "unveiled" by them)

by RC of the Peak; the relaxed and friendly atmosphere of RC of Peninsula Sunrise; the well established, well-woven club service of RC of Island West; and the good work on youth-looking after their Interact Clubs by RC of Kingspark. Pointing towards a direction...

So far of all the clubs we have visited, more than 80% of the clubs have been and continue to do at least one project in China. Capital spent so far has been large and targets are diverse. During our District Delegation visit to China in June, the Ministry of Civic Affairs indicated that with our resources, it would be a lot more helpful for them if we can combine our district resource to help them on some urgently needed effort to immunize and educate people on certain disease, namely, Hepatitis B. It does make sense to have combined resources toward a focussed target to make it cost-effective. If this kicks off well, it will be most beneficial for the Rotary image to have a signature district project.

Dear Fellow Rotarians & Friends,

Jenny and I are greatly shocked and saddened to see the tragedy occurred in New York and Washington, D.C. of U.S. A. on 11 September 2001. This is an excellent reason for Rotarians to unite together to work for World Understanding and Peace. I have sent a condolence message to Rotary International President Richard King, and placed the same on the district website. Also, I suggested to all Rotary clubs in District 3450 (at their wish) to join us in mourning the missing and the dead from this tragedy by observing a one-minute of silence before beginning their regular meetings. In view of this, Rotary International President Richard King has decided to cancel the African Presidential Conference in Cairo. The staff of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation is ready to assist you with questions or concerns to this cancellation.

September is the New Generation Month. We may focus on Rotary's youth programs, such as Youth Exchange program, Interact and Rotary Youth Leadership Award.

An Interact Bazaar was organized by the Joint Interact Council last month. The fund raised was donated to the Children's Cancer Foundation. Committee members of the event attended regular lunch or dinner meetings of Rotary Clubs to sell tickets for games arranged at the Bazaar. They worked hard in pushing the sales,

sacrificing their leisure time. The Bazaar was very successful, attracting hundreds of children with their parents from the public. Thanks to the guidance of outgoing and incoming District Interact Committee Chairmen PP Dominic Ko and PP Vincent Ng. Without their guidance, the Joint Interact Council would not be able to organize such a remarkable bazaar.

This event is an excellent opportunity to promote Rotary's public image. A strong and positive public image will increase Rotary's ability to offer more and better service to the people who need our service. The Interactors have undoubtedly shown MANKIND IS OUR BUSINESS.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an intensive training program for community youth leaders. Young people aged 17 to 30 are chosen for their leadership potential. They attend an all-expenses-paid program organized and sponsored by Rotary to discuss leadership skills and to learn those skills through practice.

Officially adopted by Rotary International in 1971, RYLA is one of the significant programs of Rotary service. Each year, thousands of young people take part in the program worldwide. RYLA program often leads to the formation or strengthening of Rotaract and Interact clubs.

It gives me great pleasure to announce that the Rotary Club of Ulaanbaatar has



decided to sponsor a new Mongolian-speaking Rotary Club. A

committee, headed by their Vice-President J. Oyungerel, is set up to work on this, hoping that the new club will be chartered in three or four months. This will provide an opportunity to the Rotarians in Ulaanbaatar to make up. The attendance of each individual Rotarian as well as the club can be greatly increased. The news is very encouraging to all Rotarians in the district. My sincere congratulations is extended to the members of the Rotary Club of Ulaanbaatar.

I have completed half of my official visits to the Rotary clubs. Club presidents are well prepared for the visit, having their club plan properly completed. Attendance was good. When I visited the Rotary Club of Bayview Sunshine, for example, every past president was at the meeting to welcome the District Governor and his delegation. A Rotarian, who has not been able to attend regular club meetings for quite some time, tried her very best to come to the meeting. I was touched by the compassion of the members extended to me.

Meanwhile, I also found that all clubs are supportive to Rotary's Global Quest. Some clubs have even set a larger goal of membership growth than I do. For example, the Rotary Club of Kowloon aims

to grow their membership from 75 to 100 by the end of the Rotary year. The Rotary Club of Tolo Harbour has a target to recruit 18 new members. The Rotary Club of Shatin aims to have 5 male and 5 female new members. Special congratulations should be extended to the Rotary Club of Shatin because it is the first time in the club's history that membership is open to female gender.

Support to the Rotary Foundation is also encouraging. Most clubs commit five Paul Harris Fellows. The Rotary Club of Kowloon Golden Mile, encouraged by PDG Dipo Sani, has committed for ten Paul Harris Fellows. The Rotary Club of Kowloon East, under the leadership of PDG Raymond Wong, has achieved a total contribution of over USD16,000.00. Thankful to all generous Rotarians. Making a commitment is good, but keeping it is even better. Please pay as early as possible. Your input would show MANKIND IS OUR BUSINESS.

# Report on District Rotary Foundation Seminar

The annual Rotary Foundation Seminar was held on Saturday, 8th September, 2001 at the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine in Aberdeen. Rotary Club of Channel Islands and Tai Po were the two host clubs for this event chaired by PP Candy Mok and PP Peter Lam under the supervision of PDG Anthony Hung, District Rotary Foundation Chairman. A total of 181 Rotarians from 45 clubs in our district attended this event and we were particularly pleased to have a good turnout of 20 Macau Rotarians as well as two delegates from Rotary Club of Ulaanbaatar including their Chartered member and Vice President J. Oyungerel. We were also delighted to have with us PDG Uncle Peter Hall who was in good shape, having recently recovered from his illness and returned from San Francisco.

In the 1st Plenary Session, our Regional Rotary Foundation Co-ordinator PDG Jackson Hsieh, our keynote speaker who came all the way from Taiwan, gave us a comprehensive update of the Rotary Foundation today. I believed all of us found PDG Jackson's talk very informative and easy to understand as the powerpoint presentation was lively and user-friendly with excellent graphics and photos display to catch our attention. In the 2nd Plenary Session, PDG Raymond Wong, Chairman of Grants Subcommittee, gave us his talk "Hands-on to Humanitarian Programs" which consisted of

practical knowledge on how clubs could get money from the Foundation for projects. The video on PolioPlus Partners Program was touching and PDG Raymond explained clearly and appealed to individual Rotarians to contribute through the PolioPlus Partners Remittance Form. Not only did we learned about Helping Grants and Matching Grants, but PDG Raymond had guided us to participate with the Open Projects List, Humanitarian Grants Opportunities List as well as a sample of a Matching Grant Commitment Letter. What a truly practical talk!

The 3rd Plenary Session after lunch was devoted to Educational Programs and Funds Development. PDG Anthony Hung acted as the moderator for the Panel Discussion on Educational Programme. Panelist PP Alexander Mak gave his presentation on Scholarship with detail reference to the Ambassadorial Scholarship Application. IPP David Loie shared with us his wonderful experience as Team Leader of the last GSE trip to District 6780 Tennessee, U.S.A while PP Alex Li gave a very lively talk on Foundation

Alumni. Not only did we hear reports from our fellow Rotarians, but we were glad to have a previous Rotary Scholar to

UK, Ms. Polly Hui as well as one of the last outgoing GSE Team member, Ms. Fonia Wong, sharing with us their own experiences and point of view regarding this wonderful service of Rotary Foundation. The message from PP Alex Li was loud and clear: we must "keep the Foundation Alumni" so they could contribute and strengthen Rotary; otherwise it would be a "waste" of our good resources.

In the 2nd Panel Discussion entitled "Why Contribute?", PDG Dipo Sani, Deputy Chairman of District Rotary Foundation Committee, was the Moderator with Panelist DGE Gloria Chan, DS Stanley Mok, PP Joseph Chui and IPP Cinderella Ngao. After hearing the panelist giving their views and personal feeling on why Rotarians should contribute to the Foundation, PDG Dipo summed up by telling us a very touching story in India some years ago where the Foundation Humanitarian programs has benefited many people in illness. PDG Dipo's message was again clear: "the Foundation is doing many good things and it is truly worthwhile for us to give and the good things we do to others will come back to us someday." During this last session, PP Stella Kan from RC Macau was also invited by PDG Dipo to make an emotional appeal for donation to help a young Philippino girl in Macau who was suffering from heart problem and urgently need surgery to save her life. A big thanks and deep appreciation to PDG Jackson Hsieh who had immediately responded by making a cash donation of US\$1,000.

We were pleased that PDG Jackson offered us very positive remarks in his closing speech in which he also praised PDG Peter Hall for staying until the very end. Above all, through this learning experience, we hoped Rotarians who attended, got inspired and strengthened their enthusiasm towards Rotary, spread the message and continued to support the Rotary Foundation as "Mankind is our Business."
